Examination Data:

If you have taken The Massage & Bodywork Licensing Examination (MBLEx), or any equivalent examinations for Massage Therapy, it may be considered to have met the examination requirement in Trinidad and Tobago. However, you must submit transcripts/certificates for the examinations taken.

Licensure by endorsement qualifications: A massage therapist applicant holding an active license in good standing in another state or foreign jurisdiction may be granted a Trinidad and Tobago license, if, in the opinion of the board, the other state's or foreign jurisdiction's examination and educational requirements are substantially equivalent to Trinidad and Tobago standards.

Substantial equivalency means a course of study at a massage school or massage program that includes one of the following:

A course of study that includes, approximately 1000 classroom hours, completed at the rate of no less than 4 classroom hours per evening and no less than 20 classrooms hours per calendar week. It must be Registered with the Government of that country, must have its Curriculum Registered or Accredited by a recognized body set up to accredit the subject matter to be taught and to comply with any other regulations set out by the state or foreign jurisdiction.

In the event that the applicant does not meet the required substantial equivalency as stated above, the applicant will then be required to write the Licensed Massage Therapist exam issued by The Massage Therapy Association of Trinidad and Tobago. This will be decided upon by The Board and Management Committee of The Massage Therapy Association of Trinidad and Tobago.
